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The toasts of Charles Dickens and Absent Members were drunk and thereafter Mr. Pickwick called on Alfred Jingle for a further effort and in happy vein he gave in Evan's Dog Hospital.

The Chairman now called on Alf. Jingle for a final item but Alf. was thirsty and his mug stood empty. G. Nupkins implored Podder to supply his needs and was promptly fined by the Chairman for interruption. Podder did his duty.
